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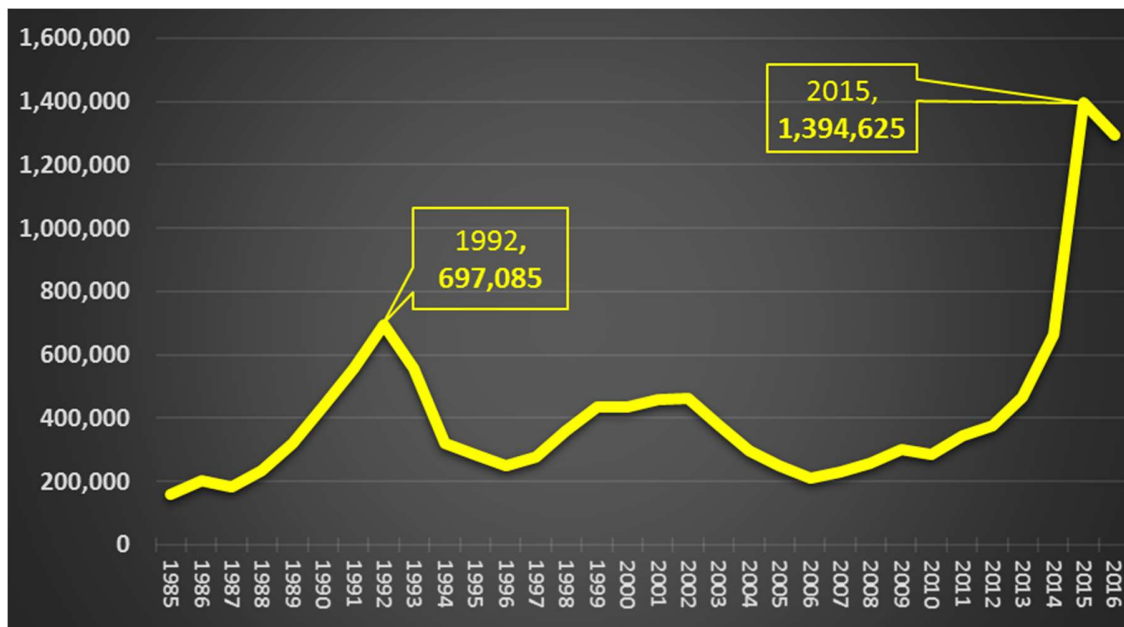


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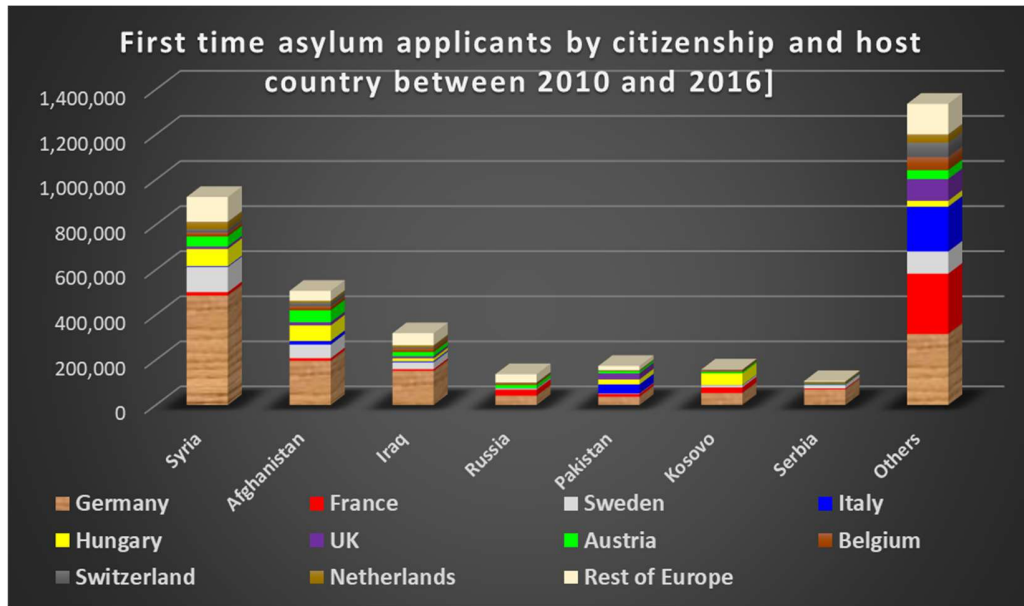


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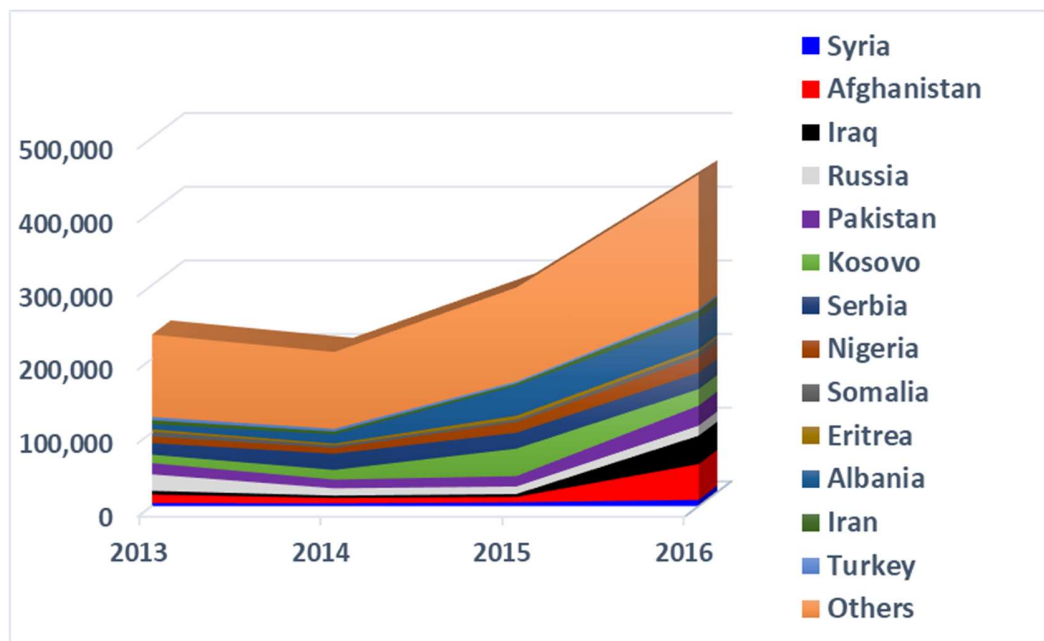


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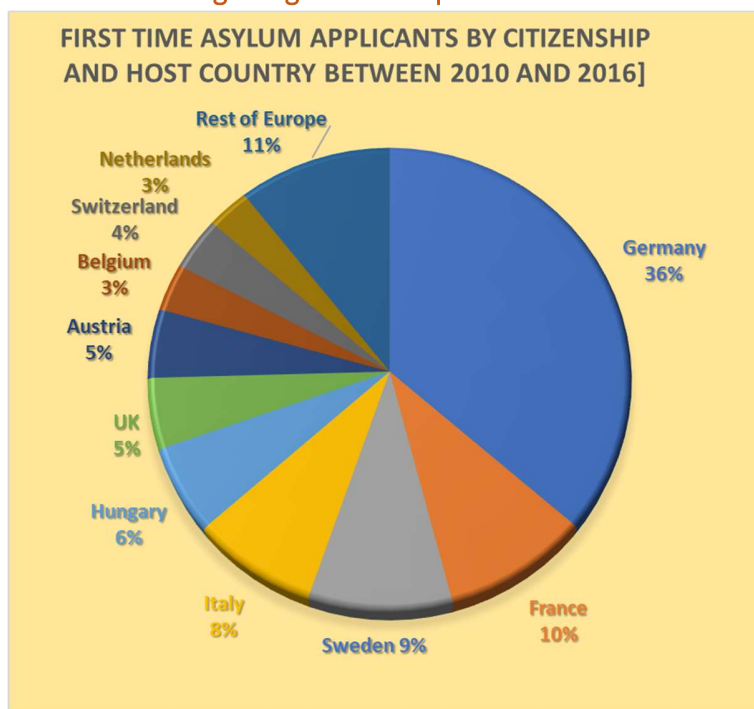


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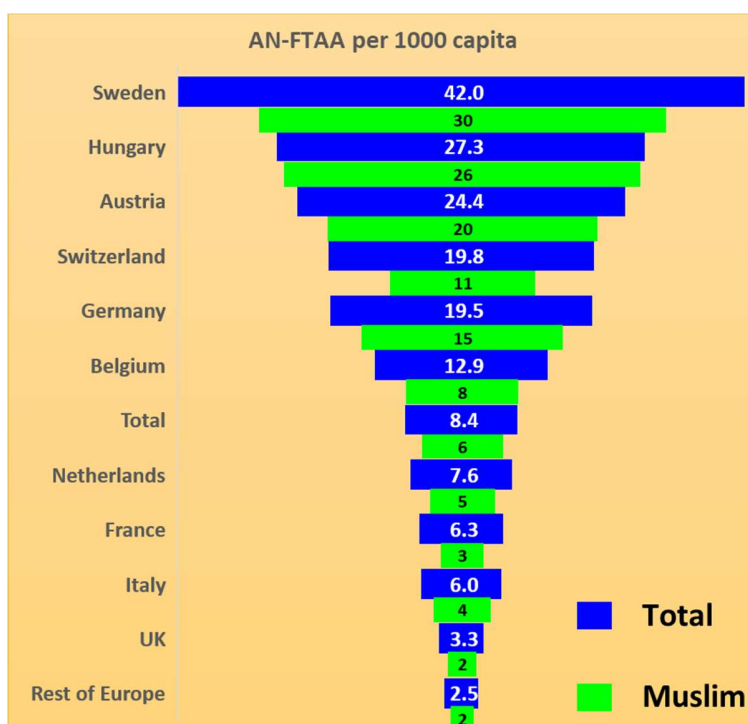


Figure 5 FTAA per 1000 capita (Hungary number is not reliable in my opinion). ref: Eurostat.

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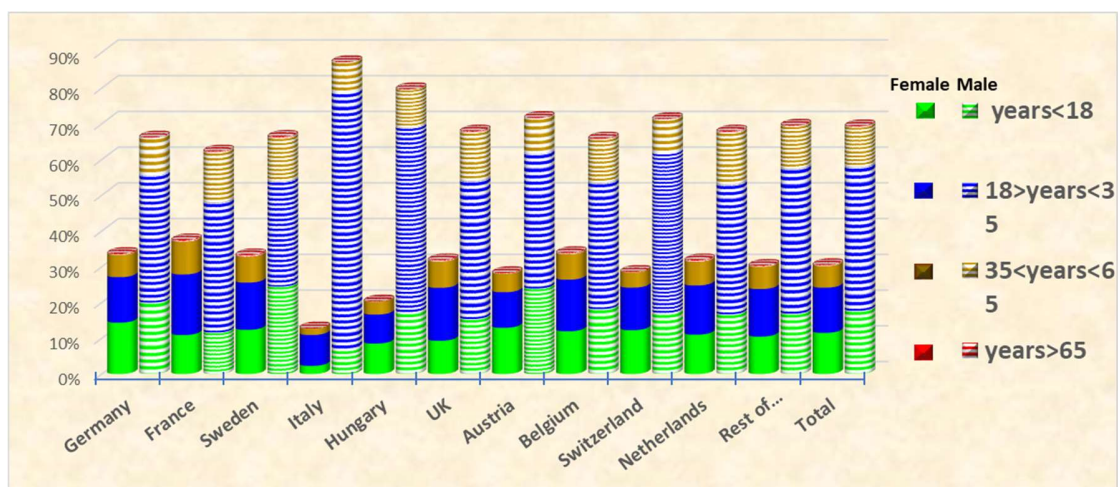


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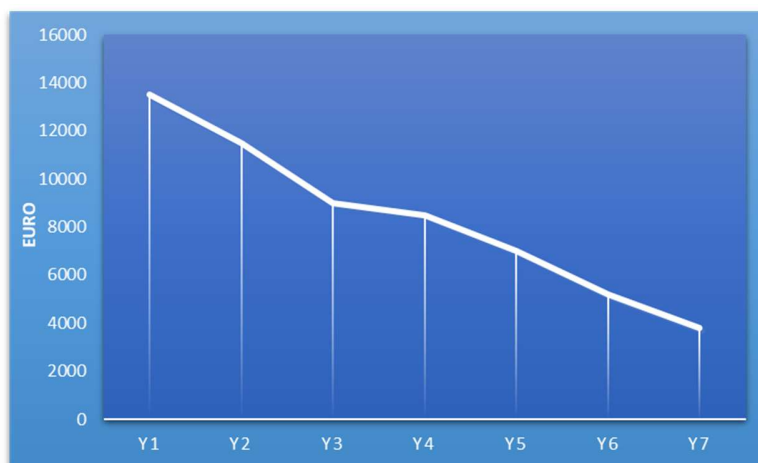


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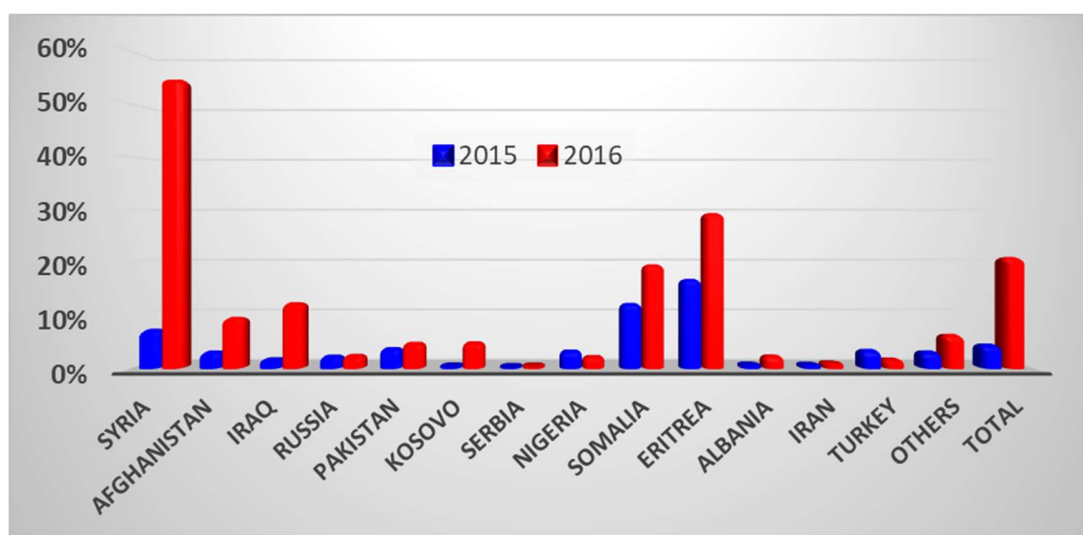


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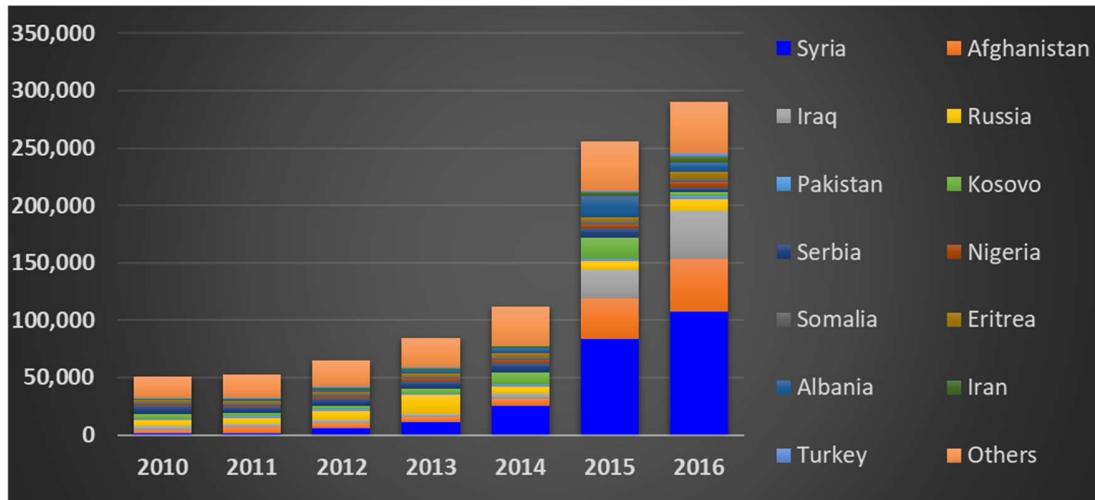


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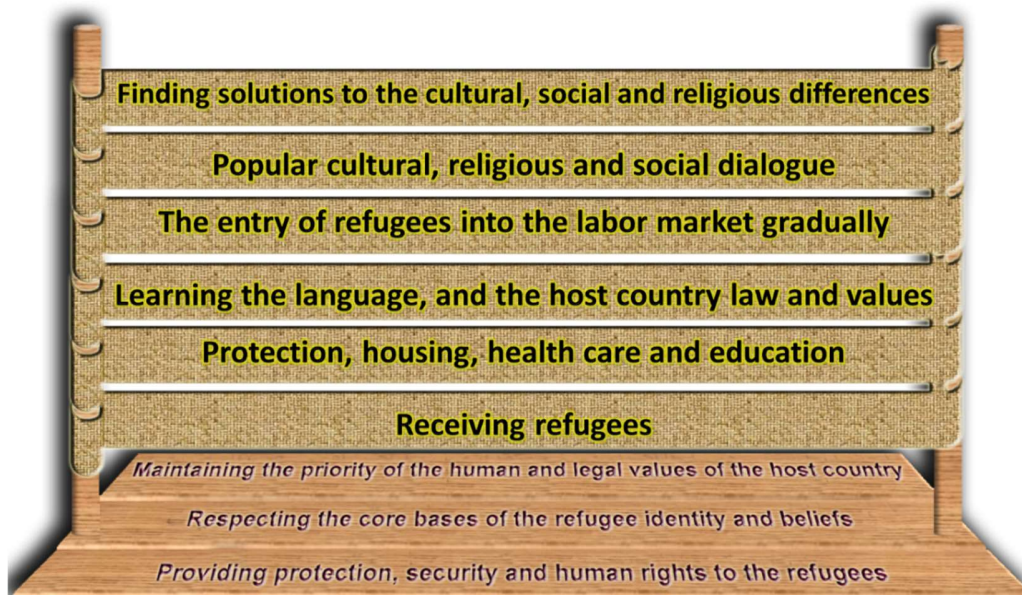


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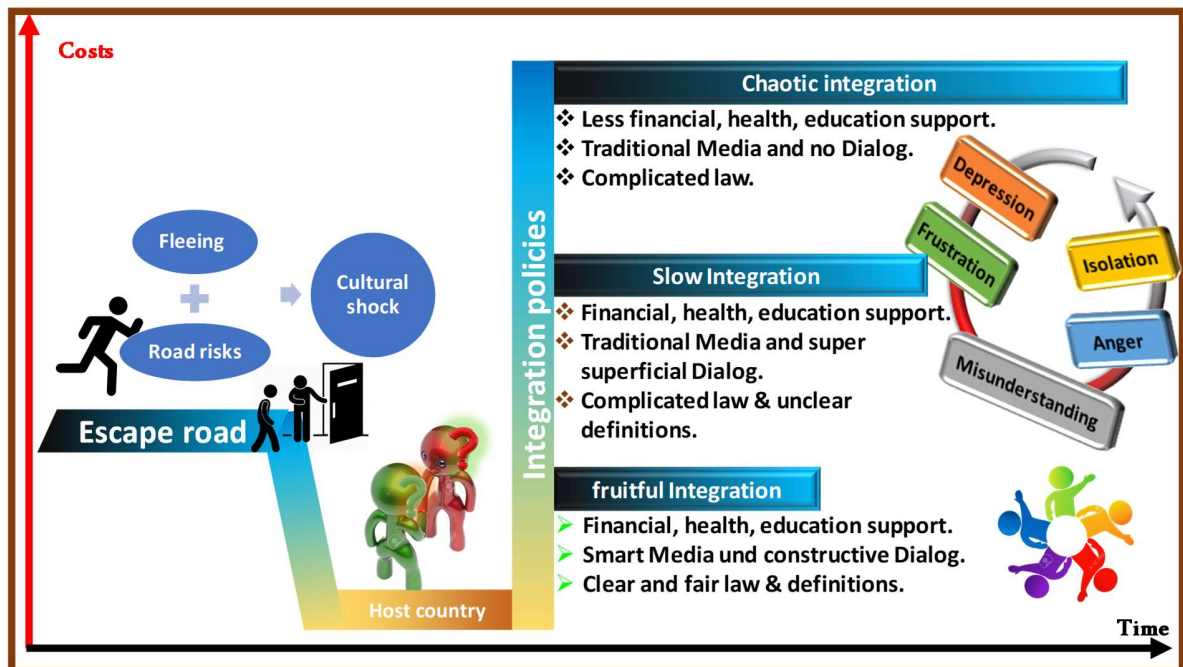
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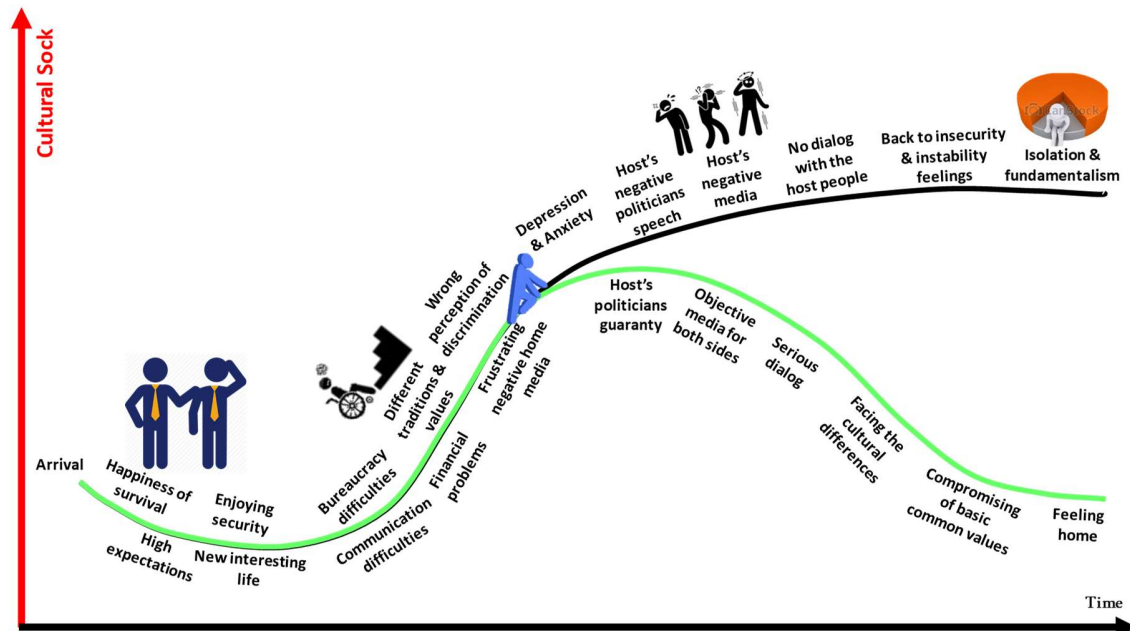
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
